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## ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION.

Articles of Association made and entered into by and between James C. Spencer, William G. Fitch, Benjamin K, Miller, Andrew. J. Aikens and Robert L. Jennings, all of whom are residents of the City of Milwaukee, in the State of Wisconsin, on this 17 th day of February, A. D. 1882, under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 86, of the Revised Statutes of the State of Wisconsin, entitled, "Of the Organization of Corporations," and the act or acts amendatory thereof.

The parties above named, and whose names are also hereto subscribed, have associated and do hereby associate together under and by virtue of the provisions of said Chapter 86 as a corporation.

First. The purposes for which such corporation is organized are for the purchasing or leasing such real estate in the City of Milwaukee as may be necessary or convenient for the lawful or proper use of the members of said corporation as a Club-house, and for the purpose of establishing, maintaining, furnishing, equipping and managing the said Club-house for the use of the members as may be deemed expedient.

Second. The name of the said corporation sball be "The Milwaukee Club," and it shall be located at the City of Milwaukee, in the State of Wisconsin.

Thrrd. The said corporation shall be without capital stock.
Fourtr. The affairs of said corporation shall be managed and conducted by six directors, and by a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.

The said officers shall be elected by the members and for the term of one year. The directors shall be elected by the members. The directors shall be divided into three classes. At the annnal meeting in $\mathbf{r} 900$ six directore shall be elected; two whose term of office shall be for one year, two whose term of office shall be for two years, and two whose term of office shall be for three years. At each annual meeting thereafter two directors shall be elected for a term of three.years,

Fiftr. The President of the corporation shall preside at all meetings of the corporation and of the Board of Directors and of the Executive Committee, and shall have a vote therein. He shall sign the certificates of membership and all notes and obligations of said corporation, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Directors, and generally perform all duties usually incumbent upon such office, and do and perform all suich duties as may be required of him by the Board of Directors.
The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President during his absence, and such other duties as may be required of him by the Board of Directors. He shall be a member of the Board of Directors and of the Executive Committee and shall have a vote therein.

The Treasurer shall countersign all certificates of membership, and shall have custody of all moneys, valuable papers and property of said corporation, and shall do and perform all such duties as usually devolve upon such office, and such other duties as may be required of him by the Board of Directors.

The Secretary of said corporation shall have the care and custody of the books of said corporation, and perform all duties assigned to him by the Board of Directors.

Sixtr. Any male person over the age of twenty-one years may be a member of said corporation, and certificates of mem-

bership shall be issued as the Board of Directors shall provide Members shall be elected by ballot of the Executive Committee, and may be discharged or expelled by a vote of the Executive Committee after notice given, as may be provided by the Board of Directors. All right and interest of each member in the estate, property, privileges and franchises belonging to said corporation shall cease at his death, or when his memberghip in the corporation is terminated, and the certificates of members shall not he assigned.
The Board of Directors may adopt such By-laws as they may from time to time deem expedient, necessary or proper to conduct the business of said corporation. The said Board shal also appoint from its members an Executive Committee, ano shall prescribe the duties and authority of said committee.

Seventh. The first meeting for the election of officers shall he held at the Newhall House, in the City of Milwaukee, on the first Monday of March, 1882, at 7:30 o' clock, P. M., and thereafter the annual meeting shall be held on the first Monday of March in each year.

The said corporation shall adopt a common seal, the form and device to be as the Board of Directors may determine.

## BY-LAWS.

## Article I.

The officers of the Club shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, a Secretary and seven (7) directors.

These officers shall be chosen by ballot at an election to be held on the first Monday in March in each year in the Club House, for which the polls shall be open from $120^{\prime}$ clock at noon until $20^{\prime}$ clock in the afternoon, and again from $50^{\prime}$ clock in the afternoon until 7 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, and a plurality of votes shall elect.

Any number of resident members, not less than five (5), may nominate candidates for such offices; such nominations shall be in writing with the signatures of the persons nominating, and shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Club at least seven (7) days before the first Monday of March; at least five (5) days before the first Monday of March the Secretary shall make and post on the bulletin board of the Club House, a certificate showing the fact of all such nominations as shall have been delivered to him in accordance herewith, and the names of the candidates and the offices for which they are nominated.

After a nomination paper has been delivered to the Secretary, no one who shall have signed the same shall be permitted to withdraw his name therefrom.

When the time has expired within which nominations can be made, the Executive Committee shall cause the names of all legally nominated candidates to be printed on one ticket, indicating thereon the office for which the candidates are severally nominated, and the ticket so made up shall be mailed to each resident member at least two days before the election. No

other form of ticket than the one hereinbefore provided for shall be used on the day of the election, and no member shall mail to any other member any other form of ticket, or any ticket on which the name of any particular candidate is marked; nor shall any such marked, or other ticket be offered to members in the Club House on the day of the election.

Each member voting shall piace a mark on the ballot opposite the names of such of the candidates of his choice as he desires to vote for, and shall personally deliver such ballot to the Judges of Election, while the polls are open.
If, in the counting of the ballot, it shall appear that any member has voted for more candidates than there are offices to be filled, the Judges of Election shall count the vote for those candidates whose names appear first on the ballot, until a number equal to the number of offices to be filled shall be obtained, and the surplus names marked on the ballot shall not be counted.

Four days prior to each annual election, the Executive Committee shall appoint three (3) members of the Club Judges of Election to receive and canvass the votes, and report, in writing, the result to the President before 8 o'clock $P$. m. on the day of the election.

In case of a tie between two or more candidates for an office, it shall be determined by lot, at the annual meeting, which of them shall be declared elected.

Notice of the annual election, together with a copy of this by-law, shall be posted on the bulletin board two weeks previous to the first Monday in March in each year.

## Article II,

The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings of the Club and of the Executive Committee.

## Article III.

The Secretary shall keep the records of all the meetings of the Club, and of the proceedings of the Executive Committee.

## Article IV.

The Treasurer shall keep the accounta and have charge of all the funds of the Club, and shall collect all dues and make all payments, He shall keep a correct list of the members of the Club, and shall render a statement of the accounts of the Club at each annual meeting, and whenever else requested to do so by a vote of the Executive Committee.

## Article V.

The Executive Committee shall have the government and control of the Club, and of its affairs, and of its membership.

The Executive Committee shall have power:
To admit and expel members by ballot-two adverse ballots excluding, or one adverse ballot excluding in case but five members of the Committee are present; and a two-thirds vote of a meeting in favor of expulsion, expelling.
To forfeit the membership of any member of the Club for non-payment of dues, assessments, or any other indebtedness, or for any misconduct, and the Executive Committee shall be the judge of what constitutes misconduct.

To fill any vacancy that may occur in any office.
To admit strangers and visitors, ineluding ladies.
To appoint, direct and dismiss all the employes and servants of the Club.

To make rules for the use of the Club by its members, and for their conduct in the Club-house, and any other regulations not inconsistent with the By-Laws.

To fix and remit penalties for the violation of the By-Laws and Rules.

To call special meetings of the Club to consider specific sub-jects-notice of such meeting to be sent to each member at least fourteen daya previous, and the subject or subjects to be atated in the notice.

To have charge of all the property, effects and assets of the Cluh, including the mangement and general superintendence of its interestg and affairs.

## Article VI.

The Executive Committee shall meet at four o'clock p. M. on the Friday next succeeding the first Monday in each month. Five members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting. Special meetings shall be called at the request of the President or Vice-President, or any two members of the Committee, upon notice given at least twenty-four hours before the time appointed therefor. In the absence of the President and VicePresident, the Committee shall choose a presiding officer pro tem. Any member of the Committee absent for three consecutive regular meetings without permission of the Committee, or quitting one of the meetings without permission of the presiding officer, may, by a vote of the Executive Committee, be held to have resigned his office.

## Article VII.

A person shall become a member of the Club upon election by the Executive Committec, payment of the initiation fee, and a proportion of the semi-annual dues corresponding to the un-

expired portion of the current half year (no notiee being taken of the fraction of a month). No person who shall be proposed for membership shall be allowed the privileges of the Club in the interval between the posting of his name and the time of final action by the directors upon his application. If the payment is not made within thirty days after notice of election shall have been sent, said election may be declared void by the Executive Committee. The names and residences of all persons proposed for membership, with the names of the members proposing and seconding them, shall be posted in the Club-house for at least ten days before being voted upon by the Executive Committee. The proceedings of the Committee upon the question of any admission to membership shall be held strictly private and confidential. Officers of the Army and Navy of the United States may be elected in the manner prescribed for regular members, but they shall be exempt from the payment of the initiation fee, and shall not be allowed to vote. Members residing in the City of Milwaukee, or within twenty miles thereof, other than officers of the Army and Navy, ahall be classed as resident members. Persons residing twenty miles or more from the City of Milwaukee may be elected as non-resident members, but they shall not be allowed to vote. A non-resident member shall pay one-half the regular initiation fee, and, so long as he is a non-resident member, he shall pay one-half the regular dues. A non-resident member becoming a resident member will be required to pay, as a condition of retaining his membership, the remainder of the regular initiation fee and full dues, to be calculated from the time of his becoming a resident member. Any resident member resigning full membership to become a non-resident member, may on his return to Milwaukee as a resident be re-instated as a full

member without payment of any further initiation fee. No candidate who shall have failed to be elected shall be again proposed for six months.

## Article VIII.

The initiation fee shall be one hundred dollars-the annual dues fifty dollars, payable semi-annually in advance, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year. When the dues, assessments or other indebtedness of any member shall remain unpaid for the period of two months after the proper notice sent, his membership may be declared forfeited by vote of the Executive Committee, and he shali thereupon cease to be a member of the Club. A member thus forfeiting his membership may be re-instated within three months after such forfeiture by the two-thirds vote of the Executive Committee, upon payment of all arrears. The Executive Committee may, in its discretion, remit the dues of absent members upon written application through the Secretary, previous to such absence. A member resigning shall be held liable for the full payment of all the semi-annual dues for the current half year. No one who shall forfeit his membership in the Club after the date of the adoption of these By-Laws shall ever be admitted into the Club-house under any circumstances, unless re-instated or reelected. If any one who has forfeited his membership shall be re-elected a member, he shall pay the amount of his indebtedness at the time of forfeiture in addition to the initiation fee:

## Article IX.

The annual meeting of the Club shall be held on the first Monday in March at eight P. m. At any meeting of the Club twenty-five members shall constitute a quorum, and in the absence of the President and Vice-President a presiding

officer pro tem. shall be chosen by the members present. The report of the Executive Committee, upon the condition of the Club on the first of January previous, shall be printed and distributed to members ten days before the annual meeting. Proxies shall not be allowed, except at meetings called to amend the Articles of Association, and no stranger shall be present at any meeting of the Club. The order of business ahall be determined by the officers of the Club, subject, however, to alceration at the pleasure of the meeting.

Article $X$.
No member shall be expelled from the Club for misconduct until he shall have been furnished an opportunity to be heard before the Executive Committee in his own defense. A motion to reconsider the expulsion of a member may be made at the same meeting when such expulsion was carried, or the next regular meeting of the Executive Committee thereafter, but at no other time; and no one who may have been expelled from the Club shall ever be re-elected a member or admitted into the Club-house under any circumstances.

## Article XI.

Residents in or within twenty miles of the City of Milwaukee, not members of the Club, shall not be admitted to the Clubhouse without the consent of the Executive Cornmittee, except to the reception room, or to an entertainment given by a member in a private room. A member may invite a stranger to the use of the Club for the period of two weeks, but can have no more than one guest at a time. The invitation may be extended for two weeks upon the written assent of a member of the Executive Committee, and may be repeated if the stranger has been absent from the city three months. The Executive

Committee may revoke any such invitation at any time. The names and residences of such strangers, and the names of the 'members introducing them, must be recorded, and hosts are held responsible for their guests.

## Article XII.

No debt beyond the ordinary running expenses of the Club shall be created without a two-thirds vote of a meeting of the Club. A two-thirds vote of a meeting of the Club shall be necessary to levy an assessment.

## Article XIII.

Twenty-five members may call a special meeting of the Club, with or without the consent of the officers, by posting a written call over their own-signatures upon the bulletin in the Club-house, and sending notices of same to all members, as prescribed in the preceding section of these By-Laws, numbered five.

## Article XIV.

Upon all questions of construction of By-Laws, the decision of the Executive Committee shall control, until overruled by a vote of the Club. Any By-Law may be suspended by a twothirds vote of a meeting of the Club.

## Article XV.

A register shall be kept in the Club-bouse, in which any member may record his name and address. Notices mailed to the address of any member as noted in the register shall be considered properly sent. If a member fails to record his address in the register, notice shall be mailed to his last address known to the Secretary of the Club. Such notices shall be held to have been received ten days after being so mailed.

## Article XVI.

No alteration shall be made in the By-Laws without a twothirds vote of the entire Board of Directors, and notices of any proposed alteration must be posted in the Club-house for at least ten days previous to the meeting at which such proposed alteration shall be hrought up for consideration.

## HOUSE RULES.

The Club-house will be open every day from the 15 th of April to the $15^{\text {th }}$ of October at $7 \mathrm{~A} . \mathrm{M}$., and from the $15^{\text {th }}$ of October to the 15 th of April at 7:30 A. M. After midnight no members except lodgers will be admitted.

The wine room will be closed at midnight. The kitchen will close at eight-thirty.

Visitors.
Residents in or within twenty miles of the City of Milwaukee, not members of the Club, shall not en admitted то тнe Clun-house without the consent of the Executive Committee, except to the reception room (no refreshments to be served), or to an entertainment given by a member in a private room.
A member may personally introduce a non-resident to the privileges of the Club for one day, by recording the name of the stranger, with his own, in the Visitor's Book. On application at the office by a member, a card will be issued admitting a non-resident for a period of not more than two weeks. Any member of the Executive Committee may, in writing on the card of invitation, extend such period two weeks, but no further extension will be given in any case.

A member shall not have more than one guest at a time.
Upon written application of a member and payment of thirty dollars in adrance, the House Committee will, at its discretion, admit strangers to the privileges of the Club for the period of three months, the same to be reported to the Executive Cornmittee at the first following meeting.

The member upon whose application any stranger is admitted to the Club will be held responsible for the conduct of such stranger, and for any debt to the Club incurred by him.

Strangers will not be permitted to vote at meetings or to introduce visitors into the Club.

On Thursdays and Saturdays, ladies, under escort of members, shall have the privilege of the Club between IOA. m. and 4 P. M.

Ladies may be admitted to an entertainment given by a member in a private room, upon any day exeept Sunday, by special permission of the House Committee. Application for such permit should be made through the Superintendent of the Club at least twenty-four hours previous to the entertainment.

## Indebtedness.

Members are required to sign cards for all orders, and upon payment will themselves stamp and deposit them in a box provided for that purpose in the office.

Members should discharge all indebtedness to the Club before leaving the house.

For the purpose of calling the attention of members to any indebtedness remaining unpaid, a notice will be mailed to delinquents on the ist of each month, stating the amount due, and in ten days a second notice shall be sent for such tickets as are then unpaid, notifying delinquents that their indebtedness will be posted, if payment be not made on or before the 2oth of same month.

## Lodging Rooms.

The lodging rooms are for either permanent or temporary use, as may be desired.

## HOUSE RULES.

## Restrictions.

Private dining rooms cannot be assigned to parties numbering fewer than four persons, and reasonable notice of any private entertainment must be given at the office.

No member, guest or visitor shall give any money or gratuity to any servant of the Club.

No member shall take from the Club-house any article belonging to the Club, nor from the library or reading-room any book, pamphlet or newspaper, nor mutilate or destroy the same.
Servants cannot be sent out of the Club-house, Upon application at the office a District Telegraph Messenger will be summoned, Messengera will not be allowed to go about the house, but will remain in the entrance hall while delivering or receiving messages.

No subscription paper can be circulated, nor any article exposed for sale in Club-house, without permission of the Executive Committee.

Wines and Liquora will be served on the main floor of the Club-house only in the cafe.

Smoking will not be permitted in the dining room or library.

Dogs will not be allowed in the Club-house.

## Games.

Cards may be played in such rooms as shall be designated, but the games of poleer, 100 and others known as round games and games of hazard, shall not be permitted in the Clubhouse. This rule includes private dining-rooms.

No member shall occupy the billiard tables for continuous games to the exclusion of others desiring to play.

## THE MILWAUKEE CLUB.

No games of any kind shall be played in the Club-house between the hour of closing on Saturday night and the hour of opening on Monday morning.

## Complaints.

Members are required to make all suggestions and complaints in writing; and deposit the same in a complaint box provided for that purpose in the office.

Complaints addressed personally to members of the Committee will not receive attention.
The superintendent is required to notify members of any violation of these rules, and report the same to the Committee on Rules, whose duty it is to see that they are complied with and to take immediate cognizance of any infraction of the same.

## Committees.

At the first meeting of the Executive Committee after the annual meeting of the Club in each year, the President shall appoint from the members of the Executive Committee three sub-committees of three members each, to be known as

The action and authority of each of these sub-committees shall be at all times subject to the supervision and control of the Executive Committee.
The Committee of the Property shall have charge of the building occupied by the Club, and the care of the same; shall see to the insurance, taxes and preservation and renewal of and

the property of the Club, including furniture and library, and shall attend to the purchase of all articles needed by the Club having a permanent nature.

The Committee on Rules shall make and enforce suitable rules for the preservation of order in the Club-house, and shall have charge of ail matters pertaining to the conduct of the members.

The House Committee shall direct and control the running of the Club, including all the different departments; shall purchase the supplies necessary for consumption, and shall have immediate supervision of all the employes.

All warrants drawn upon the Treasurer for the payment of money shail be signed by the Secretary, unless otherwise ordered by the Executive Committee in special cases.
The regular employes of the Club shall be paid semi-monthly upon pay rolls to be made out by the Superintendent and approved by the House Committee, and the Secretary is authorized to draw warrants for such payments.

Each sub-committee shall submit to the Executive Committee, at each regular monthly meeting, a summary statement of all expenditures and bills for the next preceding calendar month in the departments of the Club under the charge of such sub-committee, and only upon approval by the Executive Committee shall warrants be drawn upon the Treasurer for the payment of such bills.
Each sub-committee may authorize cash dishursementa in small sums when the same shall be necessary or expedient.
